Hike Nova Scotia Annual Report 2013-2014

The following progress was made on Hike NS's strategic directions from April 2013 to March 2014.

Advocacy

- Provided input on the NS Provincial Recreation Policy
- Supported the Backlands Coalition to preserve wildlands in Purcell's Cove
- Supported the launch of the new provincial Portage & Hiking Trail fund
- Created a "Help Make Change" page on our website giving people a list of ways they can influence decision-makers through consultations, petitions and other public engagements

Promotion

- 275 participants attended 12 events in the Fall Guided Hikes series
- 500 participants attended 27 events in the Winter Guided Snowshoe Hike series
- The Hiker Distance Award Program and the Youth Hiker Challenge continue to be popular
- In January and February the Hibernating is for Bears Contest had tremendous response with well over 100 photos posted on Twitter, Facebook and through email by people all over Nova Scotia, with lots of media coverage
- 4 Leadership Level 1: Hiking courses were held for 43 participants in partnership with the Outdoor Council of Canada

Leadership

- Held a successful Hiking Summit in St. Ann's, Cape Breton with 40 participants
- Awarded the Summit Award to Hike the Highlands Festival for outstanding leadership and commitment to the growth and development of hiking in Nova Scotia
- Continued to promote the International Appalachian Trail (IAT) in Nova Scotia
- Provided support for other organizations in their efforts to protect wilderness and preserve and expand hiking opportunities (see Advocacy)
