Hike Nova Scotia Annual Report 2014-2015

The following progress was made on Hike NS's strategic directions from April 2014 to March 2015.

Advocacy

- Provided input on draft policies including the National Recreation Framework, NS Recreation Policy and NS Trails Strategy
- Attended the Future of Outdoor Engagement and Activity session and the Parks and Protected Areas Use Forum
- Met with the Minister of Natural Resources on hiking and trail related policy issues
- Submitted a letter to the NS Department of Natural Resources opposing lifting the ban on Sunday hunting and promoted the public consultation process

Promotion

- Offered the Fall Guided Hike series with 37 hikes for 719 participants
- Offered the Winter Guided Snowshoe Hike series with 30 hikes with an estimated 600 participants
- In partnership with CBC Radio Information Morning Mainland and Information Morning Cape Breton, held contests linked with the Guided Snowshoe Hike Series. Both were tremendously successful.
- Held three Outdoor Council of Canada Field Leader – Hiking Courses in Halifax and Chester for 40 people

- Held Our biggest Hiking Summit in Parrsboro in April 2014 with 80 participants

- Continued to promote the International Appalachian Trail (IAT) in Nova Scotia, with updates to the website and meetings with the Minister of Tourism as well as the NS Tourism Agency
