Hike Nova Scotia Annual Report 2015-2016

These are just some of the highlights of progress on Hike NS's strategic directions from April 2015 to March 2016.

Advocacy

- Actively engaged in consultations on the draft Nova Scotia Trails Strategy
- Consulted with the NS Department of Natural Resources on the Sunday Hunting Ban and came out strongly against lifting the ban
- Wrote a letter to the Premier on the importance of strong legislation to reduce impacts in our wilderness protected areas
- Attended an Outdoor Leadership consultation organized by the Province
- Gained a seat on the implementation team for the Shared Strategy for Advancing Recreation in Nova Scotia

Promotion

- Offered the Fall Guided Hike series of 35 hikes with an estimated 1000 participants
- Offered the Winter Guided Snowshoe Hike series of 34 hikes with over 860 participants
- Partnered with Leave No Trace Canada in offering a series of 6 Leave No Trace summer workshops to over 150 people
- Offered a suite of Outdoor Council of Canada courses to over 70 people across the province including:
 - 6 Field Leader Hiking courses
 - 1 Field Leader Winter module
 - 1 Field Leader Hiking instructor course
- Offered 7 Re-Connecting with Nature workshops to over 130 people across the province

- Provided various letters of support to groups in support of trails and outdoor initiatives
- New trails signs went up along the International Appalachian Trail (IAT) in NS
- Met with Hike Canada about expanding the National Hiking Trail in NS
- Met with the NS Department of Natural Resources to discuss its support of the IAT and the National Hiking Trail

Strong Organizational Presence

- Continued to expand Hike NS's membership
- Saw almost 100 people attend the Hiking Summit in Scotsburn in April 2015
